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What Diseases Can Squirrels Transmit to Humans?

Since squirrels rarely bite unless they've been cornered or feel threatened, the pests are typically able to coexist with humans with little issue. However, they do carry

and transmit a handful of diseases, which makes their presence undesirable and occasionally dangerous. **Salmonellosis**—Salmonella bacteria found in their droppings causes diarrhea, abdominal cramps, and fever. In most cases, the illness lasts four to seven days

and most people recover without treatment.

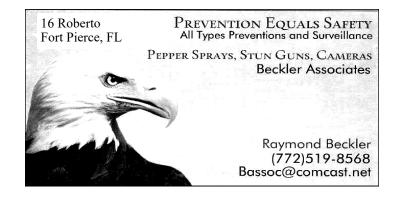
Leptospirosis—symptons include fever, headache, vomiting, jaundice and rash. The bacteria that cause leptospirosis are spread through the urine of infected animals, which can get into water or soil and can survive there or weeks or months. Humans can become infected through contact with urine (or other bodily fluids, except saliva) from infected animals and contact with water, soil, or food contaminated with the urine of infected animals.

Many different kinds of wild and domestic animals carry the bacterium. These can include, but are not limited to: cattle, pigs, horses, dogs, rodents, wild animals. When these animals are infected they may have no symptoms of the disease. Infected animals may continue to excrete the bacteria into the environment continuously or every once in a while for a few months up to several years.

Lyme Disease—spread by the ticks squirrels carry and symptoms include nerve pain, stiffness, and inflammation of the brain or spinal cord. Tick nymphs (immature ticks) are particularly tiny—the size of a few grains of salt. Because they're so small their bite is painless.

Tularemia—an unpleasant condition that brings about swollen lymph nodes and ulcers. The symptoms of ulceroglandular tularemia, or infection through the skin, can include: a skin ulcer at the point of contact with the infected animal or at the site of a bite, swollen lymph nodes near the skin ulcers (most often in the armpit or groin), severe headaches, a fever, chills, fatigue.

PLEASE DO NOT FEED THE SQUIRRELS, especially near areas where numbers of people congregate, i.e. pool areas activity areas. It is best to leave them to find their own food, preferably in the wild away from human interaction.





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County Notes

Medical Marijuana Dispensaries:

The Board of County Commissioners has moved forward deciding where the medical marijuana dispensaries may be located in the unincorporated areas of the county which includes Country Club Village and Fairways. These dispensaries must be at least five miles apart, and may not be closer than 1,000 feet to schools, day care centers, churches, parks and liquor stores. A power point map at the meeting indicated that of eight possible locations two could be here in the northern county; one in the vicinity of U.S. 1 and Kings Hwy, and one further west of I-95 along Indrio Road. The Board worked with the Sheriff's Office in making its decision, and was praised for taking the initiative in setting this policy instead of waiting for the state to issue guidelines. The cities of Fort Pierce and Port St. Lucie will decide their own policies.

Update on All Aboard Florida:

The judge tossed out lawsuits by Indian River and Martin Counties because AAF changed their methods of raising money to pay for the high speed rail. The USDOT withdrew the 2014 decision that the counties challenges making the cases moot. Earlier this month a Florida East Coast Railway trainer worked with first responders and firefighters on techniques to deal with liquified natural gas (LNG) and other fuels should an incident occur on the Treasure Coast.

Copas State Veterans' Nursing Home:

Federal funds will be released July 1st to start the building of the newest Veterans' Home in Florida. This project has been held up for two years because the DVA would not approve the site plan that was proposed by the Florida Department of Veterans' Affairs. The proposed plan called for one building, based on the successful designs of the other homes in Florida. The DVA wanted the plan to be pods, called community living centers. The argument against the pod concept was that it separated veterans from each other while a large part of their social interactions revolve around closeness. Another argument was that separate buildings are not practical in terms of operation and maintenance, especially during weather events. At a meeting last month with the new DVA in Washington, Lt. Col. Glenn Sutphin was able to state his case for duplicating the award- winning

homes we already have in Florida, and get approval for the release of funds. Did you know that when there is a "weather event" the families of the veterans and family pets are invited to stay with them, as are the employees and their families.

Maverick Boat Builders:

The major site plan was approved for the 115,000 square foot manufacturing facility on St. Lucie Blvd. Of the 250+ employees about 100 hundred will be new hires.

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Stars and Stripes—2017

The Flag of the United States of America, Old Glory, the Star-Spangled Banner, in a little over a month from now will celebrate its 240th birthday. Born on June 14, 1777, it is the third oldest national flag. She is older than the Union Jack of Great Britain (adopted in 1801) and the Tricolor of France (adopted in 1794). Only Denmark and the Netherlands have national colors that are older than Old Glory. Born in Philadelphia on June 14, 1777 at the Second Continental Congress Old Glory has been present at every major event in the history of this great country. Flag Day is often hardly mentioned in our press and even less celebrated by local businesses and individuals. It is time we remember her and proudly fly her, as she is the symbol of liberty and justice known throughout the world.

The colors of the flag are rich in symbolism and reflect a history rich in national independence, liberty, idealism and patriotism. The flag of red, white and blue stands out among the nations of the world as the spirit of liberty and the ideal of human freedom. It is best described in the pamphlet "History of the Flag" published by the Knights of Columbus as "... the glorious ideal of human freedom – not the freedom of unrestraint or the liberty of license – but a unique ideal of equal opportunity for life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness, safeguarded by the stern and lofty principles of duty, of righteousness and of justice, and attainable by obedience to self imposed laws." It goes on to expound on the flag and what it stands for: "The red represents valor, zeal and fervency; the white represents hope, purity, cleanliness of life and rectitude of conduct; the blue, the color of heaven, for reverence to God, loyalty, sincerity, justice and truth. The stars, symbolizing dominion and sovereignty, as well as lofty aspiration are encased in a constellation of blue – one star for each state -reflects our federal constitution which reserves to the states their individual sovereignty except as to the rights delegated by them to the federal government."

Our flag is not a flag of a reigning family or a royal house but the symbol of over three hundred million people welded into a nation - a nation born out of necessity, a nation with the ideals of freedom, justice and liberty for all. Ours is a nation standing

for 241 years, a nation that experimented with a new form of government and has succeeded in withstanding the challenges of time. A nation united by a vital unity and purpose; a nation whose citizens are distinguished by their clear conception of their duties and privileges and their obligations and their rights. It is fitting that we honor our flag as she has seen us through both good times and challenging times. This program, in its third year, seeks to promote respect for our flag by having participants fly the flag from Flag Day, June 14 to Independence Day July 4. Participants can register for the free program by sending their name, address, contact number and the statement "I want to show my patriotism and fly our flag" to Stars and Stripes 2017 Program Chairman, 53 Las Casitas, Fort Pierce, FL 34951. (See registration form.) Each participant will receive a certificate attesting to their patriotism, pamphlets on the US Flag and a copy of the Declaration of Independence. We would like as many as possible to register and then fly the Stars and Stripes during the 21 days between June 14 and July 4. Of course, we hope that it then will become a habit and the flag will proudly fly higher and longer.

Count me in! I am a proud American Citizen and I want to show my patriotism and fly our flag!

Hello, Welcome to Summertime!!!

I have received many questions from members of the SLCCV Veteran's Club about Fisher House and what it represents for Veterans; and also inquiries about the Honor Flight, so I thought I would investigate them and get some answers for everyone.

Fisher House Foundation is best known for a network of comfort homes where military and Veterans' families can stay at no cost while a loved one is receiving treatment. These homes are located at major military and VA medical centers nationwide, close to the medical center or hospital they serve. Fisher Houses have up to 21 suites, with private bedrooms and baths. Families share a common kitchen, laundry facilities, a warm dining room and an inviting living room. Fisher House Foundation ensures that there is never a lodging fee. Since inception, the program has saved military and veterans' families an estimated \$360 million in out of pocket costs for lodging and transportation. Fisher House Foundation also operates the Hero Miles program, using donated frequent flyer air miles to bring family members to the bedside of injured service members, as well as the Hotels for Heroes program using donated hotel points to allow family members to stay at hotels near medical centers without charge. The Foundation also manages a grant program that supports other military charities and scholarship funds for military children, spouses and children of fallen and disabled veterans. Our Veteran's Club happily donated to them this year as they certainly help.

HONOR FLIGHT MISSION STATEMENT - To transport America's veterans to Washington, D.C. to visit those memorials dedicated to honor their service and sacrifices.

OUR GOAL - Helping every single veteran in America, willing and able of getting on a plane and a bus, visit their memorial.

OUR PRIORITY -Top priority is given to America's most senior heroes — a survivor of World War II and any veteran with a terminal illness who wishes to visit THEIR memorial. The program will naturally transition to the Korean War, Vietnam War and all other veterans who served, on a chronological basis. OUR PHILOSOPHY -Since America felt it was im-

portant to build a memorial to the service and the ultimate sacrifice of her veterans, Honor Flight South Florida believes it's equally important that they actually get to visit and experience their memorial. OUR MOTTO -"We can't all be heroes. Some of us have to stand on the curb and clap as they go by." - Will Rogers

They have dedicated flights until recently for World War II Veterans, and as time progresses, the flights are opening to Korean War Veterans. There are three scheduled flights this year; May 20, 2017, September 2017 and October 2017. Their popularity has Veterans scrambling to get on flights, causing disappointment for some and a waiting period that could get to two years or more. They ask for Veterans under 60 years old to volunteer and PAY for the ride and become a Guardian for the older, not so capable Veterans. Our SLCCV Veteran's Club also has donated to them, as they are indeed good cause.
